### By our Financial Giving –

During 2016, TriCon, acting through its Mission Committee, donated \$154,304 to 29 different charitable organizations. These included donations to undergird the ministries of the MA UCC Conference and 28 local, regional, and international charities.

Over and above this total, TriCon donated to various causes through special offerings, such as Christmas and Easter, and sent funds to support unique mission projects. The income raised by the Antique Show and a portion of earnings from the Mission Endowment supplemented the amount designated from our pledges to all these efforts on behalf of our neighbors.

### By our Collective Social Action –

Highlights from the Social Action Committee for 2016 include hosting educational forums and promoting opportunities for hands-on neighboring. Homelessness was a forum topic and TriCon benefited from preachers on Martin Luther King, Jr. and Climate Justice Sundays. The committee regularly supports participation in the CROP Walk, clothing drives, school supplies, holiday gifts, Faith Works volunteering, Gaining Ground, and food donations to Open Table.

The Mission and Social Action Committees often partner on mission endeavors and are responsive to the suggestions of individual TriConnors.

## Learning More About Our Neighbors

About 70% of participants in Trinitarian Congregational Church currently reside in Concord, and around 30% come from surrounding towns, Carlisle, Sudbury, Maynard, Lincoln, Lexington, Bedford, and Acton.

When we take these zip codes as our study area and feed them into the program of demographic analysis called MissionInsite (access provided through the MA Conference of the UCC), we learn all sorts of facts and figures about our mission field. The following is just a tiny fraction of the information available.

**Population** Concord (2013) 15,954 Study Area (2017) 135,814  
The 2022 projection would see the area grow by 2,714 to a total population of 138,528.

**Age** In this study area the numbers of children 17 years of age and younger is declining, and the number of adults 55 years of age and older are increasing as a percentage of the total population.

**Average Household Income** In this study area, the estimated current year average household income is \$186,964, and is projected to grow by 12.6% to \$210,524. The number of families with incomes above \$100,000 is projected to decline over the next five years. Currently it is estimated that 75% of all household incomes exceed this benchmark, and in 2022 the percentage will be 74.6%.
