Summer is nearly here which means that we at TriCon Church are wrapping up our program year. Children's Church School winds up, committee meetings lessen, summer office hours go into effect and many of us head out of town to relax by the sea or maybe a lake or rural cabin in the woods. It's a time to re-connect with families and friends you think about all winter but have trouble spending time with during much of the other months. I hope all of us can slow down the pace, relax expectations of productivity and consciously appreciate the beauty of summer in New England.

Personally I look forward to being home in the evenings and Sunday afternoons. Jean, Vickie and I will still be designing worship and preaching each Sunday, but the pace is slower and the services more informal. This gives me precious time to ponder and reflect on the *whirlwind* of the past 9 months! It has been wisely said that life is only a reflection of what we allow ourselves to see. I find that careful reflection on past events to be a critically important factor toward expanding my sight. The American philosopher John Dewey wrote, "We do not learn from experience...we learn from *reflecting* on experience." I agree, but it's exceedingly difficult to do when you're caught in the whirlwind! I suspect many of you have a similar conflict. It takes time to unwind, settle, breathe, observe, pray and ponder. So this summer, I'm planning to intentionally make time for spiritual reflection so that I might learn from this past year and hopefully apply that learning to what's ahead.


Many of you will be away for much of the summer months and I hope you too will take time for reflection. There are lots of spiritual practices that enhance this experience. Some are exceedingly simple while others take a particular discipline. Many of us regularly practice some form of specific contemplation techniques. In fact, it turns out that we have a wide variety of individual spiritual practitioners among our community. The varied techniques include walking or biking, paddling or



swimming, being prayerfully still and present to the moment, slowly reading scripture, poetry or spiritual material; anything that invokes the wonder of Divine Presence. I find walking slowly along the shore, treasure hunting for beach glass enormously contemplative. Also I like to take out my camera at sunset and carefully photograph the smallest detail of a blooming flower just as the sun exhales the last breath of light. These moments seem to create the space needed for open reflection and spiritual listening.

Very soon you will receive in your mailbox a booklet produced by the Christian Education Committee filled with techniques of specific spiritual practices used by some of us here at TriCon. I hope you'll look through the book and maybe try one, two or even all of these suggestions. You can try these as a family, with a partner or in personal solitude. The point is to simply realize that even while you're away from TriCon Church, God's presence will be with you. We are hoping to hear stories about your experience reflecting, pondering and simply allowing yourself to steep in the presence of our God like never before.

As a church, we have come a long way together this past year and experienced many joys and sorrows. Personally, socially and professionally, many of us have both gained and lost. The pendulum of change swings fully both ways. At TriCon Church we are learning to courageously adapt to change even as we closely examine, question and critique what it means to be a relevant, vibrant and sustaining church. It has been very encouraging to observe how so many of us are finding our place of ministry and committed involvement in our TriCon community. You are reliably showing up to lend a hand, saying yes to a committee position or special project, attending meetings to organize events, freely sharing observations, and listening deeply to one another. Even in the whirlwind, our vibrancy and outreach continue to thrive as relationships deepen. We continue to grow in Spirit and discover even greater meaning and richer blessings in following in the Way of Christ, who taught us how to serve one another, welcome the stranger, feed the hungry, bless the marginalized and comfort the afflicted. We will continue gently moving forward through the summer months, reflecting on what has gone before and imagining what might be ahead. But as we do, let us all be sure to rejuvenate our spirit and tenderly nurture our soul. May we be filled with gratitude for all the good things God has blessed us with and when we reunite in September we will celebrate our renewal and continue forward as the Spirit of our Living God leads us on.

Transition Team Updates & Comments

From Rev. Dr. Jean Vandergrift



Over the last few months at TriCon you have probably been hearing the phrase “spiritual discernment” more often.

Well, as far back as the 1660s, the *goal* of church meetings within the Congregationalist tradition –

the form of church from which TriCon gets its full name and form of governance – was spiritual discernment. These early Congregationalists would gather to meet and make decisions together, because they believed they became better able to discern the will of God *together*. Also being informed by scripture and shaped by prayer, they listened for the voice of the Holy Spirit through the voices of their fellow members.

In 1957 the Congregationalists united with three other church groups to form the United Church of Christ (UCC) – TriCon’s denomination – and basically they kept the same congregational form of decision-making. The UCC constitution, for instance, declares Jesus Christ to be “the sole head of the church,” so in its life together it attempts to follow “the mind of Christ” (Philippians 2:5), once again by listening to the Holy Spirit through the deliberations of the gathered body and reaching *consensus* whenever possible.

Therefore, while Congregationalist decision-making influenced democratic forms in New England, and democracy is one type of discernment, the *church’s way* is not the same thing as that of a secular democracy. As powerfully important and good as it is to be

From The Transition Team

As we hope most of you know by now, we have developed a thoughtful, intentional process of transitioning, which we are calling Evolve. Through our work (and eating) we developed a shared awareness of our past that provides a strong basis for us to move firmly into our future. For those of you who missed out on the fun and sharing, please look for our summary of the events as handouts in the parish hall or on our website. Our TV, on the wall inside the Hubbard Street entrance, is full of photos, so you can feel as though you were with us.



As the summer begins we enter into Season Two of Evolve, *RE:flecting*, which we hope will provide us with opportunities to experience

engaged in our democratic institutions, such as participation in Town Meeting, the church's unique gift to the world in terms of coming to decisions is not voting up or down on business according to majority rule and letting the chips fall where they may, nor is the Congregationalist way simply about knowing our own individual minds and lobbying for our personal preferences as today's culture shapes us to do. The UCC (Congregationalists) seeks to make decisions by discerning together what *God* wants them to do in a particular situation at a particular time.

Besides the obvious benefit of close relationship with the Divine, this heritage is why I encourage TriCon to cultivate spiritual practices and connection. By doing so, we become more comfortable with and able over time to ascertain and follow the lead of the mysterious Holy Spirit, especially when it comes time for the congregation to make the major decision about its purpose going forward and compatible pastoral leadership. This is also why the Transition Team will be encouraging members and friends of TriCon to try out and adopt spiritual practices over the summer season of Evolve 2017. Whether we are near or far from each other over the summer months, we can be connected in the Spirit and grow in wisdom.



Renowned pianist Jacqueline Schwab will be a special guest musician for our worship service on Sunday, June 18. Following the service she will present a short concert of delightful music to celebrate Father's Day.

Jacqueline's signature style defies easy categorization, fitting somewhere in the crossover between folk, traditional, classical and new age music. Her inspirations are traditional music of England, Scotland, Ireland, and America, blues, vintage tangos, Bach's dance suites, nineteenth-century parlor piano, and the turn of the twentieth century sounds of Satie, Debussy and Bartok.

The emotional expressiveness of her playing led Ken Burns to hire her for numerous public television documentaries, including *The Civil War*, *Baseball*, and *Mark Twain*. She performed for President Clinton at the White House in 1997 to celebrate Burns' *Lewis and Clark* series and also at the Smithsonian in 2000 to celebrate its exhibition on the Presidency. In 2009 she accompanied Scottish singer Jean Redpath on *The Late Show with David Letterman*. She has also toured the USA and England to inspire people on the country dance floor through her performances with the Bare Necessities group and as a dance caller.

Ms. Schwab lives on Cape Cod and is married to a UU minister, who is also a lawyer and an avid player of concertina, fiddle and banjo.



Al Filipov Peace & Justice Forum
Sunday, September 17 at 4:00 p.m.

The *Al Filipov Peace & Justice Forum* is pleased to announce its next speaker and recipient of the *Al Filipov Peace and Justice Award*, **Michael Murphy, co-founder of MASS Design Group**, a non-profit architectural and research firm. The Forum will be held on **Sunday, September 17 at 4 p.m.**

MASS Design Group's mission is to "research, build, and advocate for architecture that promotes justice and human dignity". Working alongside Dr. Paul Farmer of Partners in Health and the Rwandan Ministry of Health, MASS Design conceived of The Butaro District Hospital, a project where local workers helped build a new facility with indigenous materials using local construction techniques. The collaborative process, led to the creation of a beautiful state-of-the-art hospital and helped to renew the spirit of a community still recovering from the horrors of the 1990's genocide.

The Forum honors the memory of Al Filipov, a beloved member of our church who died in the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. Al believed in the power of the individual to make a difference in the world. The Filipov Award is given each year to an individual who embodies Al's spirit and commitment to justice and peace.

PARSONAGE SALE



Counting Our Blessings

Church Finances 101

Chapter 1: How is the church funded?

Pledges and gifts from parishioners account for 82.5% of the church's income, rental income contributes 10% and income from endowments makes up the remaining 7.5%. There are no other sources of funding.

Pledges and gifts:

This year, we have 336 pledging units and the average pledge is \$2,225. We have 26 pledges over \$6,000 and 32 pledges of less than \$300. There is a chart of the complete breakdown of pledges in the Stewardship Report in the Annual Report. Approximately \$8,000 comes from cash donations received in the plate collection.

Gifts are always welcomed and the Finance Committee inserts a line in the budget based on expectations for a modest number of such gifts, but the budget must be based on pledges received; therefore the best way to support the church is to make a pledge. A church pledge is not a legal commitment; it can always be changed if circumstances dictate.

Rental Income:

In addition to our two tenants, LEAP Pre-school and SprInt PCS which has a cell tower in our steeple, we have long standing relationships with a business networking group that holds weekly meetings and a cello teacher offering lessons twice a week. Other short-term renters include the Concord Garden Club, Concord Chorus, music recitals and special events. We also offer our facilities on a rent-free basis to many non-profit community organizations, such as The Community Chest, Domestic Violence Services, MetroWest Legal Service, Concord- Carlisle Community Chest and others.

Endowment Income:

We have two endowment funds that are sources of income for our annual budget. The General Endowment Fund was established in 1908 and contributions have been added over the years for a total of \$378,189. With market growth and careful management, this fund has a current value of \$1,197,304 and contributed slightly less than 4% of the value to help fund last year's budget.

The Clergy Endowment Fund was established with the sale of our Laurel Street parsonage in 2012 and the income from it is earmarked to help defer the cost of clergy housing allowances. The proceeds from the recent sale of the Brook Trail parsonage will be added to this fund and the income used for the same purpose. As with the General Endowment, the Finance Committee expects to withdraw a prudent 4% toward the operating budget.
