



Last year the diaconate formed a worship committee. Their goal was to deconstruct what “worship” was, why and how we worship, and specifically examine if our worship practices at TriCon Church were an accurate and fitting expression of our faith. What they quickly discovered was that worship was more than the kinds of hymns we sing or words we pray or sermons we hear. The whole of our worship experience is always greater than the parts. Also, our individual preferences, while important, remain as distinctive and diverse as each individual who attends.

The diaconate then met one on one with many of you to hear your opinions and preferences on what makes for a holy and sacred worship experience. The information they gained was then compiled, charted, measured and discussed. The results are now being interpreted and will be communicated to you this fall.

To me, worship is many things. Individual spiritual practices, small groups and even committee work can manifest as forms of worship. But, our Sunday worship has a unique place in gathering together specifically to worship God in community. Sunday morning services should be markedly different than our day to day lives. Our Words of Welcome and Call to Worship are written and delivered to usher us into a sanctified time of total acceptance and absolute worthiness that is not measured or graded by our holiness, piety or personal successes or failures from the prior week. The goal is to bring ourselves into

community exactly as we are and feel welcomed and belonging. Whether you have lost your faith or never found a faith, we try to articulate through prayer, words, song and silence that faith is something possible, real, relevant, vibrant and critically important to all of us today. Worship, I believe, should involve our whole beings, mind, body, soul, and spirit. What we see and hear, taste and smell all adds to the full embodiment of worshiping our Living God.

Our summer worship seeks to do this in response to the distinctive climate and rhythm of the summer months. We worship in the air-conditioned comfort of the parish hall with comfortable seating, set up in the round. We gather all on the same level and look each other in the eye. We sing, pray and listen in a less formal, more interactive liturgy. I hope you will join us each Sunday you are able.

Also, this July we continue our tradition of sharing worship services with West Concord Union Church. It is such a joy to join them for two Sunday’s in their outdoor summer sanctuary as it is to host them for two weeks at TriCon in August. The July schedule is on the following page.

Wherever and however you worship this summer we hope you are renewed in faith and hope for a bright future ahead. Bring back ideas, thoughts and liturgies that might enhance our worship together and please enjoy these summer days.





UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH BUDGET

Over the next few Newsletters, we will be detailing the components that make up our church budget, starting this month with **Property**.

Our Church budget is just over \$1 million dollars -12% of that is devoted to Property. The property budget breaks down into the following:




- 21% Utilities – heat, electricity, water and sewer
- 20% Maintenance contracts that cover our two elevators, trash removal, copier lease
- 18.5% Snow removal and lawn maintenance
- 15% Maintenance and repairs for general upkeep, supplies such as cleaning and paper products, equipment repair and replacement, organ/piano tuning
- 5% Cleaning service

Additionally, we put a prudent 10.5% of our annual Property budget into reserve accounts to pay for major painting and repairs

Our property generates income through the rental of our church school wing to the LEAP preschool, the lease of our steeple to Sprint and the use of our facility for groups such as a business network, lectures, meetings and music recitals.

Our property also serves our mission goals as we offer our space rent-free to a number of community groups such as the Concord Carlisle Community Chest, Domestic Violence Services Network, Communities for Restorative Justice. Concord Carlisle Human Rights Council and others.



Please mark your calendars now for the *Al Filipov Peace & Justice Forum*. This year we are honoring Lois Gibbs for her lifelong work for environmental justice. Ms. Gibbs was the primary organizer of the Love Canal Homeowners Association where, in 1978, she brought public attention to the Love Canal environmental crisis in Niagara Falls, NY. Her actions resulted in the evacuation of over 800 families to live in safer environs. A pioneer in the field of environmental justice, she has worked to help train and support local activists with their environmental work. Ms. Gibbs is currently the Executive Director of Center for Health, Environment, and Justice in Washington, DC.

The *Al Filipov Peace & Justice Forum* was founded to promote peace and justice among all people and to demonstrate the power of an individual to make a positive difference in the world. The forum honors the memory of Al Filipov, a beloved member of our congregation, who died in the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. Held annually since September 2002, the Forum invites a distinguished individual to speak about his or her work and vision.

Melvin Slates Added to Church Memorial Area

The Town of Concord, in cooperation with the Friends of Sleepy Hollow Cemetery has just refurbished the Melvin memorial a famous sculpture in the Cemetery, entitled Mourning Victory, dedicated to three sons of the Melvin Family who lost their lives serving with the Union Army during the Civil War.


The renovation involved replacing the slates dedicated to each of the brothers: John Melvin who died in a military hospital in October 1863; Asa Melvin who was killed in battle in Petersburg, VA in June, 1864 and Samuel Melvin who died a prisoner of war in Andersonville, GA in September, 1964. Their surviving brother, John commissioned Daniel Chester French to create the monument that was dedicated in 1909.

Since the Melvin Family was associated with our church, we were offered and gratefully accepted the original slates to be set in the memorial area in our front lawn along with the fountain dedicated to Rev. Henry Martyn Grout and the granite benches dedicated to Al Filipov and Ralph Hemenway.




THANKS to the Fellowship Committee, the June *Strawberry Festival* was a great success. A good time was had by all!
